Process Farewell Kabarista

Step One: The Concept





I want to make an animatic to the song Farewell Kabarista by Vagabond Opera.

The song tells the story of a guy who falls in love with a drag queen in the thriving queer¹ scene in 1920s Berlin. However, as Germany gets increasingly hostile towards non-conforming behaviour and Hitler gains power, they become more unsafe in their own country. Living openly as a gay couple is not as safe as it once was.

In 1933, they decide to flee the country and board a ship to America, where they are forced to live a closeted life, as it's illegal in America to be in a gay relationship.

The song ends with a message to remember the queer victims of the holocaust and the hope for a better future.

¹Throughout this entire piece I will use the word queer as an umbrella term for the entire LGBT+ community. I am aware that not everyone likes this word, I personally decided to use it because it's more inclusive than LGBT+.

Animatics are a very commonly used medium of visual storytelling on the platform YouTube. It's mainly done by young fans who want to show their love for their favourite song by showing their version of the song's story, but don't have the time or resources to make a full animation. So they use a simpler form of animating instead.

Although animatics started out as a way to storyboard full animations, they have turned into their own genre, just as worthy as regular animation. Because animatics are less detailed and leave out backgrounds and such, they can achieve more abstract storytelling than regular animation.

Here are some links to some of my favourite animatics. Go Tonight and Sara Berry tell a whole story in the way my animatic does too, while the other two show one scene within a larger story. I love how MissyAsylum uses white and black smoke to show JD's influence over Veronica and Miranda Pla makes the most detailed animatics I've ever seen.


Step Two: Sketching







Sketch One



I started by sketching out some key frames I had in mind for major plot beats in the story. My main intent was to quickly put to paper what my vision for what this animatic was going to look like was.

Then I worked the three most important of those key frames out in more detail. This was to get the flow of the story more clearly visualised and to see if my concept worked as well on paper as in my head.

I used black clothes and a bowler hat versus vibrant red hair and a cane to set my two main characters apart.

The black design versus the colourful design is supposed to represent how bowler hat guy is more worried and closeted and cane guy is more carefree and out in the open.



I really didn't like how the smoke of the train turned out, so I will need to create a different way to draw the smoke in the final work. I also realised that you can't see details in black pen on black paint too late.






After seeing the three drawings side by side is when I realised I had two colour schemes I could play with. Darker, warmer colours for the scenes in Berlin, colder colours for the scenes in New York. I really like this, because it gives the scenes in Berlin a warm, nostalgic feel while it gives the scenes in New York a cold, distant feel. This represents how Berlin is their home and they're forced back into the closet in New York.



Step Three: Research





Then I started doing some historical research. The song is in the steampunk style and pretty vague about its subject matter, but I wanted my visuals to be more clear and grounded in history. I want my anymatic to bring awareness to the oppression of queer people.

I searched for "queer scene 1920s Berlin" and I found a surprising lot of information. I found two great articles by the Advocate and the New Yorker and loads of primary source pictures, even films.


I learned that the queer scene in Germany in the 1920s was much more open and thriving than I originally thought. Queer bars were technically illegal, but they were tolerated so long as there was no violence, which was very rare. There was a huge variety of queer bars and clubs in Berlin, for all different social classes. There was a lot of experimentation with gender expression and gender identity, many people came to queer parties in drag.


I found the names of multiple gay bars, but all photos of which I could find the location were taken in the Eldorado. I also found a bunch of gay films that were made in 1920s Berlin, most importantly Anders als die Andern (Different from the Others). I wanted to watch it, but I unfortunately didn't have the time. Lastly, I found multiple queer magazines, most famously Der Eigene.










Drag in the 1920s






These are some important people I came across in my research. Rae Bourbon is a drag queen and Friedrich Radszuweit created multiple queer magazines. Magnus Hirschfeld and Christopher Isherwood were both prominent queer authors who are responsible for most things we know about the queer scene in 1920s Berlin.

But as all good things, this too came to an end. When Hitler came to power, all the gay bars were shut down and many prominent figures fled the country and/or were murdered.

During Hitler's reign, many queer people (mostly gay men) were sent to concentration camps. There, they were treated as lesser beings, even by other prisoners. Many were castrated and some were used as guinea pigs in medical experiments. Others, the so-called "doll boys", were raped by other prisoners, coerced by more food or protection from hard labour.

During my research I came across another major historical event that I can use in my animatic. In 1933, shortly after Hitler became Reich Chancellor, the Institute for Sexual Science was ransacked and all its books were burned. These books contained much information about gender-affirming surgery amongst other things, and vital information to the queer community was lost. Also stolen were the Institute's extensive lists of names and addresses. This forced many queer people to flee the country, others were sent to concentration camps or murdered.

Gay prisoners in concentration camps were forced to wear a pink inverted triangle on their uniform.


This is the Eldorado in 1932 vs in 1933.








Step Five: Outlining


Sketch Nine



Then I made a storyboard for the final animatic.







This is my first storyboard for the final animatic. It is not perfect, so I will definitely be making a second one before making the final animatic, but it's not bad for a first draft. There are some great moments there that will definitely make it into the final version. I think especially the moment where I draw the connection to modern times is really powerful.

I couldn't figure out what to do during the refrains, so that will still be needed to be storyboarded. I asked the teacher for advice and I will use that in a later draft.


I also realised that I need books to feature in the first half of the animatic for the book burnings to have an emotional impact. I also realised that I needed bowler hat guy to have more personality so that he becomes more likeable.

So now my plan is to fix two problems at once. Cane guy is the more outgoing partner in the relationship, who is involved with queer clubs and the drag scene. Bowler hat guy is the more introverted partner in the relationship, who is involved with the Institute for Sexual Science and gay literature. You will see both of them in their natural habitat, having fun and doing good, before you see both of their worlds being torn down by the Nazis. Hopefully it will have more emotional impact that way.

Step Six: Animating







Then I could finally start animating. I have never done this before so I started out by watching tutorials for Adobe Animate and making a short video just trying out the possibilities of the program. I also made a video experimenting with Adobe Character Animator, but I eventually decided not to use that program in my final animatic.

Then I started animating the first 20 seconds of my final animatic. At first, I tried drawing everything in Adobe Animator. After I had frustratingly managed to draw the background, I decided to give up and start drawing the objects in Medibang. I then exported them into Adobe Animate, where I animated everything. That worked a lot better.
